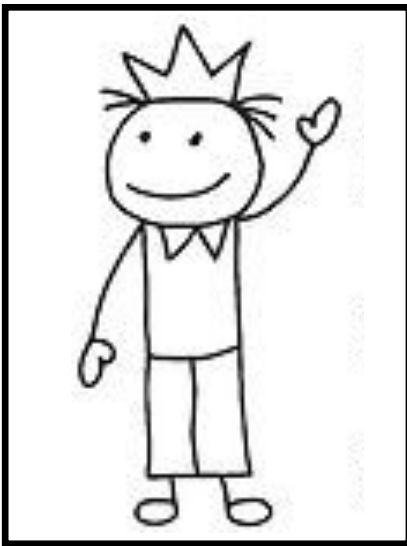


Instruction:

Use the following templates to design a tombstone and obituary for one of the major figures from history that we've studied throughout the term.

The tombstone should include the basic information about the person (i.e. name, and dates of birth/deat) as well as an epitaph. An epitaph is an inscription on or at a tomb or grave in memory of the one buried there. It is generally a brief statement commemorating the person or personal achievements of the deceased. Use the blank tombstone to create your version of the figure's tombstone. Feel free to add any extra design or detail you think necessary to reflect the historical figure.

An obituary by comparison is generally a notice of a death (like in a newspaper) most often with a biographical sketch. In other words, rather than a short phrase or statement an obituary would review/summarize the life and achievements of the person deceased. Use the following questions/ideas to help focus your research and gather the necessary information for your obituary. When you're ready to write, use the general template below to format your obituary (including picture and invented newspaper title). Overall, the obituary should be a minimum of 1 page long, 12pt font, Times New Roman, double spaced. Include it with your tombstone to get full credit for the assignment.
