World Civilizations is a comprehensive study of the human experience from the emergence of early civilizations through the Renaissance to the world of today. CLASSROOM PROCEDURES

Absences & Make Up Work

As mature students seeking a college preparation atmosphere, it is **YOUR** responsibility to obtain any notes and handouts you may have missed due to absences as well as to make up any missed work or assessments. Per school policy, you have **FIVE DAYS** to make up any assignment or assessment due to an **EXCUSED** absence.

Occasional absences are unavoidable, however, if you are absent for more than 2 classes in succession it is your responsibility to contact me so that we can work to keep you as caught up as possible (for both our benefit).

When returning from an absence, you can find what you missed by checking the **ABSENT WORK BIN**. In the folder for your class period you should find a set of handouts for everything you missed along with a cover sheet with instructions for completing work and describing any in-class activities or assessments that must be made up. Use the **MAKE-UP SIGN-UP** to notify me of when you’ll be coming in to take care of these in-class items. Lastly, make sure that any assignments that were due the day you missed are turned in **THAT DAY** to avoid late penalties.

Missing & Late Work

If you cannot turn in your homework for any reason other than absence, you will be required to fill out a **PINK SLIP** and turn it in in place of your assignment. This will be collected and filed. Failure to do so will result in an automatic **50% DEDUCTION** on the assignment.

Regardless, you may (and are encouraged to) turn in your homework late, which you can do at any point—keeping in mind that the later it is the less points it will be worth. However, assignments due before midterm will not be scored after midterm has passed, and pay attention for my ‘**DROP DEAD**’ date at the end of each term.
